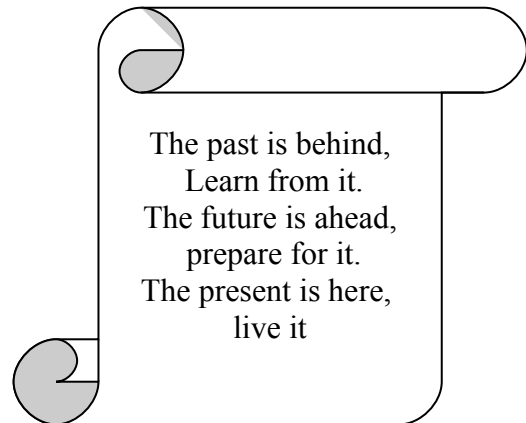

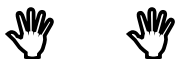

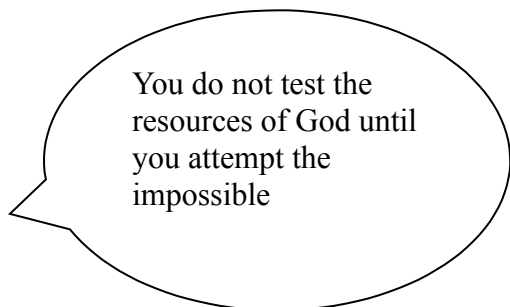

Christian Education Development Committee Report - (Sub Committee of the Kirk Session)

We are a lively and interesting group consisting of elders and members of the congregation and some of the topics we have discussed at our meetings follow.

Summer Sunday School – Numbers of children fell during the holiday period but those who did attend enjoyed a varied and fun filled programme.

Holiday Club – This had been the twenty-seventh consecutive year of the Holiday Club, which had proved very successful and enjoyable. The children had a great time, as did the leaders. Daytime numbers were smaller than in previous years, thought to be due to Sandyhills Church Holiday Club operating at the same time. The smaller numbers provided a good opportunity to get to know the children better. The evening club for Primary 6 upwards was well attended, with numbers increasing as the week progressed. Various activities including Treasure Hunt and Ten-pin bowling provided lots of fun. (I'm told a certain Mrs Park beat a certain Mr Stewart at the bowling event!!). Videos of the week's activities were shown and enjoyed in church. The week provided a great opportunity for all to enjoy bible themes in imaginative ways.

Leaflet Distribution/School Visitation –

Information on church activities were distributed at Garrowhill Primary School Summer Fayre which had a good take up and further opportunities will be available at Christmas events. Representatives of BB and GB will visit Garrowhill PS and Mt Vernon PS to promote church activities.

Praise Event - An Audio-visual version of songs for children's praise will be ready for Sunday School and Praise Band members will attend to demonstrate actions.

Church Library – A representative display of books for adults and children had been set up on two occasions through the summer and will be repeated once per month in the large hall at coffee time. Look out for a good read!!

Bible Class – Fifteen young people now attend, which is very encouraging. However as Michelle Key has come to the end of her time with them as a leader (many thanks for her input) we only have one regular leader at present, Beverley Bissett, who does a sterling job **but** she cannot continue the group on her own. **There is therefore an urgent need for other leaders or adult helpers to give their service to these young people.** Please give this prayerful consideration if you can help, even on a part time basis, and contact Beverley or any elder.

Lenten and Pastoral Bible Studies – It was noted that so much positive feedback had been received, not only by those who attended the studies, but from the congregation attending Sunday morning services. In discussion it was noted that the minister's style of preaching and style of teaching were very different, yet received the same appreciation and positive feedback. The conclusion reached was that those who enjoy the preaching at morning services might also enjoy the teaching at the bible studies. So, why not give the next study, which is on Worship a try?

SWEET PEA



Meaning delicate or blissful pleasure in the language of flowers, this enchanting flower remains a favourite fragrant blossom

Due to a national shortage of ministers, the Church of Scotland has asked their presbyteries to cut back on the number of ordained ministers within their bounds. In order to assess the needs of ministry staff for each parish within the Presbytery of Glasgow, a plan to measure the needs of each congregation has been designed. Points would be awarded in five broad areas.

1. **Parish populations.** These would be weighted for parishes depending on the ethnic mix and church allegiance, as determined at the 2001 census. With a parish of over 5,400 people and a very small ethnic community Mure Memorial should score highly in this category.
2. **Parish need.** This takes into account the health and wealth of the community. While we have a large elderly population, with all the needs that entails, with the parish being almost exclusively private sector housing, the congregation will probably score low in this section.
3. **Congregation size and strength.** This takes into account the number in the congregation, the range of ages and the financial contributions made, over the past three years. Unfortunately due to the fact that the three year period was almost entirely a vacancy situation, all of this will be lower than even it is at present, and representations will need to be made to underline this issue. However the congregation would be expected to score reasonably high in this category.
4. **Ministries and Mission Contribution.** The congregation has consistently year on year met its full contribution to the wider work of the church, and would expect to score highly in this category.
5. **Outward looking focus.** This is a much more complicated category, and the information for this is firstly to be gathered by an "audit form" of

questions, largely statistical, in relation to worship, young people, outreach events/programmes, church related groups/activities, chaplaincies, and communication, and secondly a visit to meet the leadership of the church. The form has already been banked, and we presently await the visit of the presbytery team.

The team will be assessing this “outward looking focus”, based on assessable questions, covering 8 aspects of the congregation’s work and witness.

- i) **The impact made on the local community through Christian witness of organisations run by the church.** The congregation is expected to score high in this area.
- ii) **The impact made on the community through the witness of the individual members and associates of the congregation.** Once again we would expect to score high here.
- iii) **The vision for, the planning and delivery for, outreach events and programmes.** With the exception of the Holiday Club and a stall at the GAP day, and this year the School Fair, there has been little happening in this area and the expectation is that we will score low.
- iv) **The provision for welcoming strangers.** While there is some good work being done here there is some more to be worked on and a middle range score can be expected.
- v) **The willingness of the congregation to change for the sake of others.** There have been quite considerable changes particularly in the area of worship and we would fully expect to score high in this category.

vi) **Sharing of workload between paid staff and volunteers.**

Since all the activities in the congregation are largely run by volunteers it is expected that a high score will be achieved here.

vii) **The priority given by the congregation to the most vulnerable within their community.**

With the priority given to young children and senior citizens in the use of the building and the pastoral care offered to the bereaved and those in hospital a high score should be achieved in this section.

viii) **The involvement and engagement with World Mission.**

This is probably our weakest section, with little or no contact with World Mission or other agencies working the global mission agenda.

Each congregation within the Presbytery is being assessed in the same way towards the allocation of a full-time or part-time minister and/or other staff (e.g. youth worker, pastoral assistant etc.) The team of assessors will be at Mure Memorial within the next three months, with the result known in the middle of 2012.

Meanwhile the Kirk Session continues to set out and implement its own priorities, aided by the vision outlined above, and other experiences of church and faith, that might improve those areas where we are weak and even improve on our best in the areas where we are strong.
